Reception

Wow! We are already into our second half term! Where has the time gone?

It has been a wonderful first half term. The children have taken everything in their stride and risen to every challenge set before them as they've settled into school life. We couldn't be any more proud! We even attended our first school assembly last week and the children sat beautifully and listened carefully to Mr Gunstone, although they were a little startled when the whole school began to sing... they'll soon be joining in I'm sure!

Throughout October we have loved learning all about autumn and harvest. The colours, sights and smells as well as observing autumn artefacts including fruits and vegetables after reading 'Oliver's Vegetables', 'Pumpkin soup' and 'The Leaf Thief'. We also enjoyed engaging in Black History month, reading and discussing the story of Rosa Parks.

In October the reception class also learned to read! Yes – we are now readers! The listening in our class phonic sessions has been amazing and we are now sound-blending simple words with pride and confidence. Thank you to all the parents who came to our phonics zoom. Remember the best way to help your child with phonics is to read their reading book with them as all books are phonically matched. If you were unable to make the evening please see the PowerPoint I put on tapestry and as always if you have any questions please ask Mrs Busfield or I. In maths we are developing a super grasp of the number system; including counting, value, order, more and less, partitioning and recombining, addition and subtraction.

Finally, thank you also for all of the lovely additions to tapestry. We absolutely love reading your observations from home! They help us to build a fantastic picture of your child's learning journey. Keep them coming...

<u>Year 1</u>

Each day, Year One have come to school with smiley faces and readiness to learn. There has been lots of learning and exploring this October.

We have spent the first half term exploring 'Ourselves' through Science and PSHE. We finished our topic by making mini collages of ourselves, thinking carefully about our clothes, eye colour and hair colour. Take a look at our wonderful display of everyone in Year One that will remain in our classroom all year to show how unique and individual we all are.

In Maths, we have started to learn about addition, including learning the + and = symbols and using these to write number sentences. We have used lots of maths resources to build part-whole models and finding all the number bonds to 10.

Everyone has been working tremendously on Phonics and have completed the first set of phonemes in Phase 5. Each week, we try to read as many phonemes as we can in 35 seconds – our current score is 22 phonemes in 35 seconds and each week we are improving our score. Year One have particularly enjoyed guided reading sessions where we engage with stories as a whole class and in small groups.

In English, we have been exploring 'Oliver's Vegetables' by Vivian French. We have sung lots of songs to remember the days of the week to help us make a timetable of what Oliver ate on each day. Surprisingly, Oliver's grandad from the story visited our classroom and we asked his character lots of questions about his allotment and growing vegetables. We also read another book by the same author called 'Oliver's Fruit Salad' which inspired us to design, make and evaluate our own fruit salads. We started by choosing the fruits, carefully cutting them with a knife, mixing them together and lastly, the best part – tasting!



Lastly, Year One have loved visiting the computer room to practise their computing skills. In only a few weeks, everyone can now log in to their account themselves using the keyboard to find each letter and control the mouse. We have been sorting objects, using 2paint to create a

picture and designing our avatars.

What a fantastic October everyone!

<u>Year 2</u>

The Year 2 class have worked, learned and challenged themselves VERY hard indeed through October and we are so impressed with them! They have calculated & counted, written & edited whole stories, made, created, investigated AND... read & Read & READ! Mr Gunstone has been to our classroom while showing groups of visitors around our school and he is SUPER impressed with how calm we all are and how focused on our learning. We feel PROUD of ourselves!

A highlight in October was our visit to Skipton Castle. The children listened so well during their guided tours and were fascinated by the tales from the past they heard. Anything gruesome and ghastly was particularly well received! We danced in the great hall, imagined Rapunzel trapped in the tower, tried our hand at target practise like a medieval archer and, of course, LOVED our packed lunches! Very big thanks to all the parents who came to help us and to those of you who also offered. We are very grateful. If you are interested to see the dancing, as well as our team castle models, there just may be a chance for you to do that during parents evening this half term... watch this space.

We rounded off our unit of English on Rapunzel with a lovely piece of poetry. We thought about when the witch threatens to put a terrible curse on Rapunzel and decided to make our own gruesome potion! We added spiders, worms (all pretend of course!), witches hair, cobwebs, magic sparkles and much more. We then watched the potion bubble, foam and fizz over the side of our cauldron. We thought of adjectives and verbs to describe what we could see and what the potion was doing. We then used these in our diamond poems.

The children have been learning lots about animals in Science this month. We have learnt about the human life cycle and compared it to other animals, such as a butterfly and a frog. We have learnt about what animals need to survive as well as the importance of

exercise and the effect it has on our bodies.

<u>Year 3</u>

What a busy first half-term in Year 3! In English, we have been learning about imperative or 'bossy' verbs



and prepositions. We have written a very bossy set of instructions based on 'How to wash a Woolly Mammoth'. This all links with our history topic this term of the Stone Age to Iron Age. We have also made our very own Woolly Mammoths out of reused milk cartons. Thank you so much for bringing them into school! I hope you are impressed by all of our interesting creations brought home. We also enjoyed our first school trip to Craven Museum to take part in a Stone Age workshop. All of the children engaged with this fabulously and it is a fantastic resource right on our doorstep! They are all looking forward to returning for our Romans workshop in the Spring term.

In Science, we enjoyed learning all about Rocks and Soils. The children really engaged with this topic and it brought many discussion points. A big thank you to all of the many interesting rocks and fossils brought in from home, as we have had many show and tell sessions to discuss these! We have learnt all about Mary Anning and her amazing discovery of the Icthyosaur. We have also conducted our very own soil

Investigation and collected various soil samples from around school to discover the key differences between soil and to make scientific comparisons on.

In Maths, we have started addition and subtraction with a large focus on number lines and the column method. The children were very excited to draw on the tables using whiteboard pens and construct their own number lines, and HTO columns. A big thank you to all of your efforts at home on MyMaths as well!



In ICT, we have now finished Online Safety and are improving our touch-typing skills.

We have been using BBC Dance Mat and Purple Mash to do this. We have also finished 'rock and roll' themed dancing with Howard on a Monday and are going to be learning some outward bound and orienteering skills in PE next half-term.

We have lots to look forward to during the next half-term in Year 3. I hope the children enjoy the choir workshop in November, the KS2 Christmas production and all of the exciting learning opportunities in the run-up to Christmas.




<u>Year 4</u>

enacting some of the miracle stories from the Bible.


In Science, we have continued to learn about states of matter and the children were amazed to discover that gas does have a weight. They have also used thermometers to measure temperature in different places around school.

<u>Year 5</u>

Whenever we sit back to reflect on the past month, we are always amazed by how much we have fitted in and October has been the same.

In Science we finished our Space Topic. We learnt all about the orbit of the planets around the Sun, the orbit of the moon around the Earth and why we have day and night. We have kept a moon diary to look at the different phases of the moon. We enjoyed creating plasticine models to demonstrate our understanding and even had a go at acting out the Solar System.

We used our knowledge of the different phases of the moon to write some amazing metaphor poems. The standard of the poems was so high that we have created an anthology of them so we can enjoy reading each other's during ERIC.

We love reading in Year 5 and are continuing to enjoy the adventures of Feo in our class novel The Wolf Wilder and we continue to share our own favourite books with each other during our 'Reading Shelfie' time. It is lovely to hear about all the wonderful books that are out there. Many of them new to us!

In PE, we have been dancing and improving our athletics skills. We have all made great progress in both areas. Many pupils from Year 5 represented the school at the Skipton Schools' Cross-Country event. The grit and determination all runners showed was impressive.

In History, we have continued to learn about the Industrial Revolution and the evidence that we can see. We have enjoyed learning how the Cottage Industry moved on to mills and factories in places like Skipton, that became populated with mill workers. We also started our Geography topic about North America.

PSHE has been all about e-safety. We have had some very interesting and important discussions about how to keep ourselves safe on line. We have thought about the information we share online, what happens to

this (our digital footprints) and how to protect ourselves or report things if it goes wrong. We have also discussed communicating with people we don't know, the dangers of this and again how to protect ourselves and report things that make us feel uncomfortable. Hopefully all valuable lessons that the pupils will apply in their everyday lives.

Earlier in the month, Year 5 were invited to watch a concert by Skipton Camerata. For some of the class, this was their first experience of listening to live classical music. The concert was

fantastic and the class joined in with the music discussion and listened very carefully.

In Art, we have been learning more about David Hockney. We looked at ways of making black, in the style of Hockney and created some wonderful artwork using perspective.

Another enjoyable and productive month Year 5. We can't wait to see what excitement November will hold.




<u>Year 6</u>

These last two weeks we moved onto the smallest things of all - microbes. Our yeast


experiment was very successful - as you can see from the photos!- and created much excitement as the hands got bigger!

Autumn Term has been a busy one and the achievements so far have been amazing.

Please Do Your Part To Reduce Water Street Traffic!

As we edge closer to the Winter months, I know that there is greater temptation to drive to school and drop the children off as close as possible.

Elliot Street is a tight road at the best of times and in recent weeks I have had a number of complaints/concerns brought to me regarding the volume of traffic during school drop-off and pick-up times, with particular fears over the safety of children crossing the road. We were very close to an accident the other day with someone backing into a driveway to turn around.

So far, we have not had an accident. However, I worry that if we do not work together on this there will come a day when I am asking for your support not through fear of an accident, but rather because there has been an accident.

To reduce traffic on Elliot Street, I have been informed that the traffic wardens allow parents to park for a short time in Coach Street car park whilst walking to and from school, without requiring a ticket. To help with this, we are in the process of creating a Water Street drop-off badge that you will be able to put in your car window, to make traffic wardens aware that you are on the school run.

I have also been asked to request that Water Street parents avoid using the St Stephen's Church car park.
